I understand that although the program that I am admitted to may offer virtual attendance, as a student on an F-1 Student Visa, I am not eligible to attend virtually. Doing so would risk my SEVIS status and could result in losing my ability to legally remain in the US and attend university.

Note: The Code of Federal Regulations on this topic is 8 CFR 214.2(f)(6)(i)(G) and there are various places you can read about the regulations, including at <a href="https://www.ice.gov/sevis/schools/reg">https://www.ice.gov/sevis/schools/reg</a>. Although SEVP/SEVIS is modernizing the regulations to address hybrid and virtual classrooms, the current regulations address traditional online classes, in traditional semester-based programs, in which graduate-level students are enrolled in nine units per semester, fall and spring only. The CFR's state that graduate students can take one online class per semester. Cohort students do not fit into that traditional category, nor can taking an online class in a traditional semester be interpreted to mean that classes can be taken virtually. Exception: If a professor announces that an exam or project can **only** be done online/virtually, of course, you must comply.
